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MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS At September 30, 2019

As Management of the Authority, we offer readers of the Authority's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Authority for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2019. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements as presented elsewhere in this Report.

A- Financial Highlights

- 1- The assets of the Authority exceeded its liabilities at the close of the most recent fiscal year by \$17,513,371 (net position) as opposed to \$18,022,482 for the prior fiscal year.
- 2 As of the close of the current fiscal year, the Authority's Proprietary Fund reported ending Unrestricted Net Position of \$(3,730.814) as opposed to \$(467,020) in the prior fiscal year.
- 3 The Authority's unrestricted cash and cash equivalent at September 30, 2019 was \$34,322,719 representing an increase of \$947,592 from the prior fiscal year. The increase is attributed to excess operating revenues over expenses and transfers from the RAD Rehab account to reimburse the operating account for prior year capital expenditures.
- 4 The Authority had Total Operating Revenues of \$5,956,616, and Total Operating Expenses of \$5,363,431 for the year ended September 30, 2019.
- 5 The Authority's capital outlays for the fiscal year were \$830,801 which was funded by the RAD Rehab account.
- 6 The Authority's Expenditures of Federal Awards amounted to \$1,462 for the current fiscal year.

B - Using the Annual Report

1 - Management's Discussion and Analysis

The Management's Discussion and Analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Authority's financial statements. The Authority's financial statements and Notes to Financial Statements included in the this Report were prepared in accordance with GAAP applicable to governmental entities in the United States of America for Proprietary Fund types.

2 - General Purpose Financial Statements

The financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Authority's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business. They consist of The Statement of Net Position, Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position, and Statement of Cash Flows.

The Statement of Net Position presents information on all the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net position. Increases or decreases in net position will serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

2 - General Purpose Financial Statements

The Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position presents information showing how the Authority's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of unrelated cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g.; depreciation and earned but unused vacation leave).

The financial statements report on the Authority's activities. The activities are primarily supported by HUD subsidies and grants. The Authority's function is to provide decent, safe and sanitary housing to low income and special needs populations. The financial statements can be found on pages 8 through 10.

3 - Notes To Financial Statements

The Notes to Financial Statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the financial statements. The Notes to Financial Statements can be found in this Report after the financial statements.

4 - Supplemental Information

The Schedule of Proportionate Share of Pension Liability of Public Employees Retirement System, Schedule of Authority Contribution to the Public Employees Retirement System, Schedule of Changes in the Total OPEB Liability and Schedule of Contributions to the Employees State Health Benefit Plan are presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) 68 and 75 The Schedule of Proportionate Share of Pension Liability of Public Employees Retirement System and Schedule of Authority Contribution to the Public Employees Retirement System can be found of pages 32 and 33, respectively and the Schedule of Changes in the Total OPEB Liability and the Schedule of Contributions to the Employees State Health Benefit Plan can be found on pages 34-35 respectively. The Financial Data schedule is presented for additional analysis only. The Financial Data Schedule can be found on pages 27-31.

C - The Authority as a Whole

The Authority's Total Net Position decreased by \$509,111. The decrease was primarily caused by the adoption of State health Benefit Plan used to report OPEB liabilities under GASB 75: Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions. Under GASB 75 the Authority was required to adjust its beginning equity by \$1,130,793 to properly reflect the entire liability to the Pension System.

By far, the largest portion of the Authority's net position reflects Net Investment in Capital Assets (e.g., land, buildings, equipment and construction in progress). The Authority uses these capital assets to provide housing services to its tenants; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. The unrestricted net position of the Authority is available for future use to provide program services.

D - Budgetary Highlights

For the year ended September 30, 2019, individual program or grant budgets were prepared by the Authority and were approved by the Board of Commissioners. The budgets were primarily used as a management tool and have no legal stature. The budgets were prepared in accordance with the accounting procedures prescribed by the applicable funding agency.

As indicated by the excess of revenues over expenses, when adjusted by depreciation expense, the Authority's Net Position increased during the fiscal year.

E - Capital Assets and Debt Administration

As of September 30, 2019, the Authority's investment in capital assets for its Proprietary Fund was \$22,373,164 (net of accumulated depreciation). This investment in capital assets includes land, buildings, equipment and construction in progress.

Additional information on the Authority's capital assets can be found in Note 4 to the Financial Statements which is included in this Report.

2 - Long Term Debt

During the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005, the Authority entered into a Capital Fund Leveraging Pool. The New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency issued bonds and the funds were distributed to the Housing Authority. In December 2004, the Authority received \$4,217,333 to be used for capital improvements to its buildings. Further details can be found in the Note 7 to the financial statements. On July 14, 2017 the Housing Authority converted all of its housing units to HUD's Rental Assistance Demonstration Program (RAD). At the same time it entered into a \$3,150,000 term loan note. The proceeds of the note were used to repay the NJ HMFA Revenue Bonds. The remaining proceeds of the note will be used to make capital improvements to the Authority's housing units.

F - Significant Changes from FYE September 30, 2018 to September 30, 2019

Restricted Cash decreased due to expenditures related to capital improvements required RAD. The proceeds will be used to fund capital improvements to the housing units and fund the replacement reserve fund.

Accounts Receivable Other decreased due to a receipt of a balance receivable from the Edgewater Housing Authority for HAP payments.

The Authority's rental revenue increased by \$570,649 during the current fiscal year while HUD grants decreased by \$996,889. The Authority transitioned to RAD during the prior fiscal year which eliminated both operating and capital fund subsidy received from HUD. Instead, they will receive a HAP payment and related administrative fee. Tenant rents increased due to approximately 35 tenants changing from flat rents to 30% of income. Additionally, the HAP received is also being charged to tenants rent. HAP payments received under the RAD program were \$2,184,430.

Accrued Pension and OPEB liabilities decreased by a net \$1,804,692, based on actuarial calculations computed for each liability. The liability will increase and decrease each year based on investment returns, employee and employer contributions and participants to the plan.

H - Economic Factors and Next Year's Budgets and Rates

The following factors were considered in preparing the Authority's budget for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020:

- 1 The state of the economy, particularly in light of current world affairs.
- 2 The use of the Authority's Unrestricted Net Position to fund any shortfalls rising from a possible economic downturn and reduced subsidies and grants. The Authority's Unrestricted Net Position appears sufficient to cover any shortfall.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Housing Authority of the City of Hackensack ("the Authority") which are comprised of the Statement of Net Position as of September 30, 2019 and 2018 and the related Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Position and Cash Flows and Notes to the financial statements for the year ended.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. This includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Housing Authority of the City of Hackensack, as of September 30, 2019 and 2018, and the results of its operations, and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis presented on pages 1-5, the Schedule of Proportionate Share of Pension Liability of Public Employees Retirement System and Schedule of Authority Contribution to the Public Employees Retirement System presented on pages 32 and 33, and the Schedule of Changes in the Authority's Total OPEB Liability and Related Ratios and Schedule of Authority Contributions to the Public Employees Health Benefit Plan presented on pages 34 and 35 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures don not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements of the Housing Authority of the City of Hackensack. The Financial Data Schedule is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The financial data schedule, the Schedule of Proportionate Share of the Net pension Liability of the Public Employees Retirement System, Schedule of Authority Contribution to the Public Employees Retirement System, the Schedule of Changes in the Total OPEB Liability and the Schedule of Authority Contributions to the Public Employees Health Benefit Plan are the responsibility of management and were derived from and directly relate to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards general accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the financial data schedule and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards We have also issued our report dated December 16, 2020 on our consideration of the Housing Authority of the City of Hackensack's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. NOTE 1 -Summary of Organization, Activities and Significant Accounting Policies:

- A. <u>Organization</u> The Housing Authority of the City of Hackensack (The Authority) is a governmental, public corporation created under the laws of the state of New Jersey to provide housing for qualified individuals in accordance with rules and regulations prescribed by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Authority is governed by a Board of Commissioners which is essentially autonomous but is responsible to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs. An Executive Director is appointed by the Authority's Board to manage the day-to-day operations of the Authority. The Authority is responsible for the development, maintenance and management of public housing for low and moderate income families residing in the City of Hackensack. Operating and modernization subsidies are provided to the Authority by the federal government.
- B. <u>Activities</u> The combined financial statements include all the accounts of the Authority. The Authority is the lowest level of government over which the Authority's Board of Commissioners and Executive Director exercise oversight responsibility. The Authority is not included in any Governmental "reporting entity" since its board members, while they are appointed primarily by the mayor, have decision making authority, the power to designate management, the responsibility to significantly influence operations, and primary responsibility for accounting and fiscal matters. The Authority has not identified any entities which should be subject to evaluation for inclusion in the Authority's reporting entity.

On July 14, 2017, the Authority converted all its public housing properties to HUD's Rental Assistance Demonstration Program (RAD). Under RAD the PHA will cease to receive operating and capital fund subsidies but rather will receive HAP Payments to subsidize tenants rent. Simultaneously, the Authority entered into a shared services agreement with the Edgewater Housing Authority to act as the contract administrator under each RAD PBV HAO contract between the Authority and Edgewater Housing Authority.

C. Significant Accounting Policies

a. <u>Basis of Accounting</u> – The accrual basis of accounting is used for measuring financial position and operating results of Proprietary Fund Types. Under the accrual basis of accounting, transactions are recognized when they occur, regardless of when cash is received or disbursed. Proprietary Fund revenues and expenses are recognized on the accrual basis, with revenues recognized in the accounting period in which they are earned and become measurable, and expenses recognized in the period incurred, if measurable. Thus, for example, proprietary funds recognized revenue in the period in which a service is provided, regardless of how long after the end of the period the revenue is expected to be collected.

Using the accrual basis of accounting is consistent with the proprietary fund focus on measuring all the costs of providing goods or services for the period and matching those costs with the revenues earned during the period by providing the goods or services.

b. Report Presentation – The financial statements included in this Report were prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) in the United States of America applicable to governmental entities for Proprietary Fund Types. The Authority implemented the provisions of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 34 "Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments" (Statement No. 34). The Authority also adopted the provisions of Statement No. 37 "Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments: Omnibus" and Statement No. 38 "Certain Financial Statement Note Disclosures", which supplements Statement No. 34.

NOTE 1 -Summary of Organization, Activities and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Statement No. 34 established standards for all state and local governmental entities that include a statement of net assets, a statement of activities and a statement of cash flows. It requires the classification of net assets into three components — Invested in Capital Assets, Net of Related Debt; Restricted Net Assets and Unrestricted Net Assets. Statement No. 63 "Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of resources, and Net Position" requires the re-naming of the Statement of Net Assets to the Statement of Net Position.

The Statement of Net Position reports all assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources and net position. These classifications are defined as follows:

Net Investment in Capital Assets – This component consists of land, construction in progress and depreciable assets, net of accumulated depreciation and net of the related debt outstanding. If there are significant unspent related debt proceeds as of year-end, the portion of the debt related to the unspent proceeds is not included in the calculation of Net Investment in Capital Assets. Rather, that portion of the debt is included in the same net asset component as the unspent proceeds.

Restricted Net Position – This component includes net position subject to restrictions placed on net asset use through external constraints imposed by creditors (such as debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or constraints imposed by the law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Unrestricted Net Position – This component consists of net position that does not meet the definition of Restricted Net Position or Net Investment in Capital Assets.

The adoption of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statements 34, 37 and 38 have no significant effect on the basic financial statements, except for the classification of net assets in accordance with Statement No. 34.

Significant Accounting Policies are as follows:

1 – Cash and cash equivalents are stated at cost, which approximates market. Cash and cash equivalents include cash in banks, petty cash, certificates of deposit, and other investments with original maturities of less than three months from the date of purchase.

Investments are recorded at fair value based on quoted market prices. Fair value is the amount at which a financial instrument could be exchanged in a current transaction between willing parties.

- 2 Collection losses on accounts receivable are charged against an allowance for doubtful accounts.
- 3 Buildings and equipment are recorded at cost for all programs and depreciation is computed on the straight line basis.
- 4 Repairs funded out of operations, such as painting, roofing and plumbing, are charged against income for all programs.
- 5 The Authority is subsidized by the Federal Government. The Authority is not subject to Federal or State income taxes, nor is it required to file Federal and State income tax returns.
- 6 Operating subsidies received from HUD are recorded as income when earned.

NOTE 1 - Summary of Organization, Activities and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

- 7 The cost of accumulated unpaid compensated absences, including fringe benefits, is reported in the period earned rather than in the period paid.
- 8 Prepaid expenses represent payments made by the Authority in the current year to provide services occurring in the subsequent fiscal year.
- 9 Inventories in the Proprietary Fund consist of supplies and are recorded at the lower cost or market.
- 10 The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period.
- 11 The Authority has elected not to apply to its proprietary activities Financial Accounting Standards Board Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles, Board Opinions, and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee of Accounting Procedures issued after November 30, 1989.
- 12 The Authority does not have any infrastructure assets for its Proprietary Fund.
- 13 Inter-fund receivables and payables arise from inter-fund transactions and are recorded by all funds affected in the period in which the transactions are executed.
- 14. Long-lived assets to be held and used are tested for recoverability whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. When required, impairment losses on assets to be held and used are recognized based on the fair value of the asset and long-lived assets to be disposed of by sale are reported at the lower of carrying amount or fair value less cost to sell. As of September 30, 2019 and 2018, the Authority has not recognized any reduction in the carrying value of its fixes assets when considering AU 360.
- 15. The Housing Authority has adopted GASB 65. Under GASB 65, debt issuance costs are expensed in the period incurred. This represents a significant change from the previous practice which was to record these costs as assets and amortize them over the life of the related debt.
- c. <u>Budgetary Policy Control</u> The Authority submits its annual operating and capital budgets to the State of New Jersey Department of Community Affairs in accordance with New Jersey statute. After the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs approves the budget, it is formally adopted by resolution of the Authority's Board of Commissioners. Once adopted, the Board of Commissioners may amend the legally adopted budget when unexpected modifications are required in estimated revenues and expenses. Each fund's budget is prepared on a detailed line item basis. Revenues are budgeted by source and expenditures are budgeted by expense classification within each revenue source.
- d. The Authority adopted GASB Statement 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions which requires employers to recognize their proportionate share of the collective net pension liability, collective deferred outflows of resources, collective deferred inflows of resources and collective pension expense excluding that attributable to employer-paid member contributions. Additional information regarding the adoption of GASB 68 can be found in Note 6 to these financial statements.

NOTE 1 -Summary of Organization, Activities and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

e. New Accounting Pronouncements - During 2018 fiscal year, the Authority was required to adopt GASB Statement 75, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions. GASB Statement No. 75 establishes standards for recognizing and measuring liabilities, deferred inflows and outflows of resources and expense, as well as identifying the methods and assumptions required to project benefit payments, discount projected benefit payments to their actuarial present value, and attribute that present value to periods of employee service. This standard replaces the requirements of GASB Statement No. 45. This standard was adopted and is effective as of July 1, 2017. The standard is applied retroactively, resulting in the restatement of other postemployment benefit liabilities and a prior period adjustment reducing unrestricted net position as of September 30, 2017 by \$2,909,425. Additional information regarding the adoption of GASB 75 can be found in Note 9 to these financial statements.

NOTE 2 - Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Authority maintains cash, cash equivalents and investments in local banks. The funds are covered by collateral agreements that require the institution to pool collateral for all governmental deposits. In addition, the collateral must be held by an approved custodian in the Authority's name. Cash and cash equivalents of \$6.333,408 and \$6,139,635 at September 30, 2019 and 2018 consisted of the following:

The carrying amount of the Authority's cash and cash equivalents on deposit as of September 30, 2019 was \$6,333,408 and the bank balances were \$6,506,041. Of the bank balances, \$257,053 was covered by FDIC insurance and \$6,248,988 was covered by a third party collateral agreement.

The Authority's cash and cash equivalents are categorized as prescribed in GASB 40 to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the Authority. As described above, \$6,248,988 of the Authority's deposits exceeded FDIC insurance and were collateral agreements required by the State of New Jersey.

NOTE 3 - Investments

The Authority's investments include two certificates of deposit with a maturity greater than one year from the date of purchase and are stated at fair value in the Statement of Net Position, with all gains and losses included in the Statement of Activities. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Realized gains or losses on the sale of investments are calculated using the specific-identification method. Unrealized gains and losses represent the change in fair value of the individual investments for the year, or since the date of acquisition, if acquired during the year.

Investments are measured at fair value. Generally accepted accounting principles establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

Level 1 inputs are adjusted quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Organization has the ability to access at the measurement date. Level 1 inputs provide the most realizable measure of fair value as of the measurement date.

Level 2 inputs are based on significant observable inputs, including unadjusted quoted market prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, unadjusted quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, or inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability.

Level 3 inputs are significant unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

The level of the fair value hierarchy within which a fair value measurement in its entirety falls is based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety.

All of the Authority's investments at September 30, 2019 and 2018 are included in Level 1 of the hierarchy.

NOTE 4 - Fixed Assets

Fixed assets consist primarily of expenditures to acquire, construct, and improve the facilities of the Authority and are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation. The following is a summary of the fixed asset changes for the fiscal years ended September 30, 2019 and 2018

NOTE 5 - Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT)

Under Federal, State and local law, the Authority's programs are exempt form income, property and excise taxes. However, the Authority entered into a new agreement with the city and is now required to make a payment in lieu of taxes (PILOT) in accordance with the provisions of its Cooperation Agreement with the City of Hackensack. Under the Cooperation Agreement, the Authority must pay the municipality the lesser of 10% of its net shelter rent or the approximate full real property taxes. During the fiscal year ended September 30, 2019 and 2018 PILOT expense of \$198,462 and \$198,617 was accrued respectively.

NOTE 5 - Accrued Compensated Absences

Accrued compensated absences of \$215,135 and \$219,437 at September 30, 2019 and 2018 respectively represents amounts to which employees are entitled to based on accumulated leave earned in accordance with the authority's Personnel Policy. Employees may be compensated for accumulated vacation leave up to one year in the event of retirement from service at the current salary. Employees may be compensated for sick leave at retirement or termination at 75-100% of the earned, accrued and unused sick leave at the current salary to a maximum of \$15,000. The current portion was \$21,514 and \$21,944 respectively at September 30, 2019 and 2018.

NOTE 6 - Pension Plan

General Information about the Pension Plan

Plan Description - The Authority participates in the New Jersey Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) which is sponsored and administered by the New Jersey Division of Pensions and Benefits. PERS is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefits pension plan administered by the State of New Jersey, Division of Pensions and Benefits (the Division). PERS issues a publicly available report that can be obtained at the following website: www.state.nj.us/terasury/pensions/annrpts.shtml.

Benefits Provided - The vesting and benefit provisions are set by N.J.S.A. 43:15A. PERS provides retirement, death and disability benefits. All benefits vest after ten years of service, except for medical benefits which vest after 25 years of service or under the disability provisions of PERS.

The following represents the membership tiers for PERS:

- Tier 1 Members who were enrolled by July 1, 2007.
- Tier 2 Members who were eligible to enroll on or after July 1, 2007 and prior to November 2, 2008.
- Tier 3 Members who were eligible to enroll on or after November 2, 2008 and prior to May 22, 2010.
- Tier 4 Members who were eligible to enroll on or after May 22, 2010 and prior to June 28, 2011.
- Tier 5 Members who were eligible to enroll on or after June 28, 2011.

Service retirement benefits of 1/55th of final average salary for each year of service credit is available to tiers 1 and 2 members upon reaching age 60 and to tier 3 members upon reaching age 62. Service benefits of 1/60th of final average salary for each year of service credit is available to tier 4 members upon reaching age 62 and to tier 5 members upon reaching age 65. Early retirement benefits are available to tiers 1 and 2 members before reaching age 60, tiers 3 and 4 before age 62 with 25 or more years of service credit and tier 5 with 30 or more years of service credit before age 65. Benefits are reduced by a fraction of a percent for each month that a member retires prior to the age at which a member can receive full early retirement benefits in accordance with their respective tier. Tier 1 members can receive an unreduced benefit from age 55 to age 60 if they have at least 25 years of service. Deferred retirement is available to members who have at least 10 years of service credit and have not reached service retirement age for the respective tier.

Contributions - The contribution policy for PERS is set by N.J.S.A. 43:15A and requires contributions by active members and contributing employers. State legislation has modified the amount contributed by the State. The State's pension contribution is based on an actuarially determined amount, which includes the employer portion of the normal cost and an amortization of the unfunded accrued liability. Funding for the noncontributory group benefits is based on actual claims paid. For fiscal year 2016, the State's pension contribution was less than the actuarial determined amount.

The housing authority's contribution amounts are based on an actuarially determined rate which includes the normal cost and unfunded accrued liability. Chapter 9, P.L. 2009 provided an option for local employers of PERS to contribute 50% of the normal and accrued liability contribution amounts certified for payments due in State fiscal year 2009.

NOTE 6 - Pension Plan - Continued

Such employers will be credited with the full payment and any such amounts will not be included in their unfunded liability. The actuaries will determine the unfunded liability of those retirement systems, by employer, for the reduced normal and accrued liability contributions provided under this law. The unfunded liability will be paid by the employer in level annual payments over a period of 15 years beginning with the payments due in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012 and will be adjusted by the rate of return on the actuarial value of assets.

<u>Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions</u>

At the June 30, 2019 and June 30, 2018 measurement dates, the Authority reported \$2,089,017 and \$2,256,516, respectively, for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The Authority's portion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the Authority's long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating employers, actuarially determined. The Authority's allocation percentages as of June 30, 2019 and June 30, 2018 were 0.0115937% and 0.01146051%, respectively.

Pre-retirement mortality rates were based on the Pub-2010 General Below-Median Income Employee mortality table with an 82.2% adjustment for males and 101.4% adjustment for females, and with future improvement from the base year of 2010 on a generational basis. Post-retirement mortality rates were based on the Pub-2010 General Below-Median Income Healthy Retiree mortality table with a 91.4% adjustment for males and 99.7% adjustment for females, and with future improvement from the base year of 2010 on a generational basis. Disability retirement rates used to value disabled retirees were based on the Pub-2010 Non-Safety Disabled Retiree mortality table with a 127.7% adjustment for males and 117.2% adjustment for females, and with future improvement from the bases year of 2010 on a generational basis. Mortality improvement is based on Scale MP-2019.

The actuarial assumptions used in the July 1, 2018 valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study for the period July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2018.

In accordance with State statute, the long term expected rate if return on plan investments (7% at June 30, 2019) is determined by the State Treasurer, after consultation with the Directors of the Division of Investment and Division of Pensions and Benefits, the board of trustees and the actuaries. The long term expected rate of return was determined using a building block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class included in the PERS's target allocation as of June 30, 2019 are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate - The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 6.28% as of June 30, 2019. This single blended discount rate was based on the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 7.00%, and a municipal rate of 3.50% as of June 30, 2019 based on the Bond Buyer Go 20-Bond Municipal Bond Index, which includes tax-exempt general obligation municipal bonds with an average rating of AA/Aa or higher. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from plan members will be made at the current member contribution rates and that contributions from employers will be based on 70% of the actuarially determined contributions for the State employer and 100% of actuarially determined contributions for the local employers. Based on those assumptions, the plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make projected future benefit payments of current plan members through 2057. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on plan investments was applied to projected benefit payments through 2057, and the municipal bond rate was applied to projected benefit payments after that date in determining the total pension liability.

NOTE 7 - Long Term Debt

During the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005, the Authority entered into a Capital Fund leveraging pool. The New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency issued tax exempt, twenty year Capital Fund Program Revenue Bonds, 2004 Series A. The Authority's share of the funds from the bond issue pool amounted to \$4,335,000. The related closing costs of \$117,667 are to be amortized over the 20 year life of the bonds. The net funds received form the leveraging pool were restricted and spent in accordance with the Authority's Capital Fund Budget within four years.

On July 14, 2017, the Authority converted all of its public housing units to HUD's Rental Assistance Demonstration Program or RAD. Simultaneously they entered into a \$3,150,000, 4.25% fixed interest note. The note is being amortized over 18 years and has a balloon payment of \$1,761,570 on the maturity date, August 1, 2035. Principal and interest payments are \$15,611 and began on September 1, 2017. The proceeds from the note were used to satisfy the outstanding tax exempt NJ HMFA bonds.

NOTE 8 - Risk Management

The Authority is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft, damage to and destruction of assets, errors and omissions, and natural disasters for which the Authority carries commercial insurance. During the years ended September 30, 2019 and 2018 the Authority's risk management program consisted of various insurance policies for fire, general liability, crime, auto and public officials' errors and omissions. Periodically, but not less than once annually, the Authority conducts a physical inspection of its Projects for the purpose of determining potential liability issues. Liabilities are reported when it is probable that a loss has occurred and the amount of the loss can be reasonably estimated. Settled claims relating to the commercial insurance have not exceeded the amount of insurance in any of the past three fiscal years.

NOTE 9 - Other Post Employee Retirement Benefits (OPEB)

PLAN DESCRIPTION

The Authority administers a cost sharing multiple employer defined benefit postemployment health care benefit (OPEB) plan. The Authority was required to adopt a resolution to participate in the Plan. Coverage under the plan is available to employee spouses and benefits may continue to surviving spouses.

NOTE 9 - Other Post Employee Retirement Benefits (OPEB) - Continued

BENEFITS PROVIDED

The Plan provides medical and prescription drugs to retirees and their covered dependents of the Authority. Under the provisions of Chapter 88, P.L 1974 and Chapter 48, P.L 1999, the Authority elects to provide postretirement medical coverage to its employees and must file a resolution with the Division. Under Chapter 88, the Authority has elected to provide benefit coverage based on the eligibility rules and regulations promulgated by the State Health Benefits Commission. Chapter 48 allows the Authority to establish their own age and service eligibility for employer paid health benefits coverage for retired employees. Under Chapter 48, the Authority may assume the cost of postretirement medical coverage for employees and their dependents who 1) retired on a disability pension; or 2) retired with 25 or more years of service credit in a State or locally administered retirement system and a period of service of up to 25 years with the employer at the time of retirement as established by the employer; or 3) retired and reached the age of 65 with 25 or more years of service credit in a State or locally administered retirement system and a period of service of up to 25 years with the employer at the time of retirement as established by the employer; or 4) retired and reached age 62 with at least 15 years of service with the employer. Further, the law provides that the employer paid obligations for retiree coverage may be determined by means of a collective negotiations agreement.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION

GASB Statement No. 75 requires the Authority to recognize its proportionate share of the collective net OPEB liability, collective deferred outflows of resources, collective deferred inflows of resources and collective OPEB expense.

HEALTH CARE TREND ASSUMPTIONS

For pre-Medicare medical benefits, the trend is initially 5.7% and decreases to a 4.5% long term trend rate after eight years. For post-65 medical benefits, the actual fully insured Medicare Advantage trend rates for fiscal year 2020 are reflected. The assumed post-65 medical trend is 4.5% for all future years. For prescription drug benefits, the initial trend rate is 7.5% and decreases to a 4.5% long term trend rate after eight years.

DISCOUNT RATE

The discount rate for June 2019 was 3,50%. This represents the municipal bond return rate as chosen by the State of New Jersey. The source of the Bond Buyer Go 20- Bond Municipal Bond Index, which includes tax-exempt general obligation municipal bonds with an average rating of AA/Aa or higher.

NOTE 10 – Construction Commitments

At September 30, 2019 and 2018, the authority's outstanding construction commitments were not material. The costs pertaining to such commitments will be paid by the RAD Rehabilitation Reserve and RAD Reserve for Repair Accounts.

NOTE 11 - Economic Dependency

For the year ended September 30, 2019 and 20087, a substantial portion of the Authority's revenues were received from the U.S. Dept. Housing & Urban Development, which are subject to availability of funds and Congressional approval, as well as the Authority's compliance with Federal rules and regulations.

NOTE 12 - Prior Period Adjustments

During the current fiscal year the Authority adopted the use of the New Jersey State actuary report for reporting liabilities related to other post-employment benefits (OPEB). The result of adopting the state report resulted in the Authority reducing beginning equity by an net amount of \$1,130,793.

Note 13 - Subsequent Events

Events that occur after the balance sheet date but before the financial statements were available to be issued must be evaluated for recognition or disclosure. The effects of subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that existed at the balance sheet date are recognized in the accompanying financial statements. Subsequent events which provide evidence about conditions that existed after the balance sheet date require disclosure in the accompanying notes. Management has evaluated subsequent events through December 16, 2020, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued and concluded that one subsequent event has occurred that would require recognition in the financial statements or disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the novel strain of coronavirus (COVID-19) a global pandemic and recommended containment and mitigation measures worldwide. The COVID-19 outbreak in the United States has caused business disruption through mandated and voluntary closings of office facilities, including the offices of the Authority, and shelter in place orders for all but those deemed essential services. While this disruption is currently expected to be temporary, there is considerable uncertainty around the duration of the closings and shelter in place orders. As a result, the Authority has changed the manner in which its services are performed. Those changes include tenant intake and recertification procedures, maintenance services and planning and completion of capital improvements. Additionally, the pandemic has impacted the housing authority's ability to collect rents due to the loss or reduction tenants' income. Although HUD has provided additional subsidies to assist the Authority in meeting these financial challenges, it is probable that this matter will result in a negative impact on the Authority's financial positon and results of operations. However, the ultimate financial impact and duration cannot be estimated at this time.
